#### **19 PROJECTS + 130 TEACHERS =** 4,170 STUDENTS DIRECTLY PARTICIPATED

Our reach is a much more significant story when you include the indirect involvement of additional teachers and families of students. An amazing example is **Joe Ruhl's project, Charles Darwin: Substitute Teacher.** Mr. Ruhl videotaped his Darwin lesson so that other Jeff High School teachers could incorporate it into their curriculum. And, of course, it will be shared with JHS students for many more years. In addition, Mr. Ruhl will share his lesson materials at the annual convention of the Hoosier Association of Science Teachers, Inc. in February 2019. If each teacher attending his workshop has an average of 100 students, then potentially, 7,500-10,000 Indiana biology students could make use of this teaching strategy. **WOW!!**
