Greetings from PSFTC! Over the past year, things did not slow down. Due to the pandemic, the needs of our educators changed, and we quickly

responded. Last August as schools were re-opening, we funded thirtyseven "Rapid Response Grants" in just seven days! These grants were aimed at helping teachers address pandemic-related needs.

Thankfully, as we moved into 2021, we were able to return to our traditional grant cycle. We awarded over \$10,000 this past spring to six applicants representing each of our three school districts. We also helped facilitate a grant for TSC which provided co-regulation kits for students to use over the summer. Requests for the kits surpassed the 300 mark in under an hour, clearly demonstrating the importance of this need.

As we move into the fall, we welcome two more activities: our Cupcake Run/Walk for Public Education, where everyone gets a cupcake courtesy of Gigi's Cupcakes, and our Fall Grant Cycle, where we aim to award another \$15,000 to our educators. Our annual Cupcake Bake-off, traditionally held in the fall, will be moved to February 2022. Be on the lookout for more information on this exciting event, sponsored by Tate & Lyle!

Grant Spotlight

Julie Riley - Wea Ridge Middle School

Connecting Book, Brain, and Heart: Using Neuroscience in the Middle School Language Arts Classroom

(awarded in 2019, implemented in 2020-21 school year)

My grant was truly a seed for excellence since Covid-19 restrictions only allowed me to implement about half of the grant as planned. It's wonderful that this project was planned in such a way that it can only make next year even better. My first component was for professional development resources to improve social-emotional learning in middle school. We pushed my timeline back to order these materials in the fall and start implementing them at the end of quarter 1 and into quarter 2. I was able to bring in my neuroanatomy guest speakers, virtually.

At the end of each quarter, I led students through self-reflection practices to help us set our focus for the next quarter. By the third quarter, we were able to integrate our understanding of emotional triggers to our study of literature. We used our book, brain, heart reflections with the novels *Watsons Go to Birmingham* and *The Civer*. I added a bulletin board to our hall to reflect how books help us self-regulate and build empathy.

I am forever changed as a teacher, and I know this was a very meaningful experiencefor my students to show resilience this year. I'm ready to bring on 2021-22- a year for reflection, recovery and reconnection!





Grant Spotlight

Jill Rubacha - Jefferson High School

Programming Across Manufacturing with Robotics

This project served to deliver relevant programming and robotics experience to students in an engineering course at Jefferson High School. New equipment was able to be purchased that reflects current



offerings in real-world settings. This was an improvement over our prior offerings, which featured technology and implementation approximately ten years out-of-date. Students got to engage in programming in the Java language and to use equipment to create competitive robots for a small competition. The first section of the project took place alongside traditional classroom activities. Students worked with modular test boards utilizing equipment from the grant purchase to develop their programming skills.


The second half of the project was modeled after a robotics competition. Students needed to utilize their programming skills from the project and their manufacturing skills from prior units in the class. The ability to purchase several new control hubs made this section of the project feasible. Students used their new Java programming skill to create autonomous robots. These robots would have to accomplish all tasks without human intervention, relying on the students' prewritten instructions. Secondly, they created a control system for



their robots, allowing them to respond to real-time controls. The most notable reaction was that students learned that programming was not as difficult as they had feared. All equipment purchased through this grant is reusable and will be implemented in future activities and curriculum at Jeff, giving these same opportunities to new students each year.

Grant Spotlight

Megan Ulrich - Tippecanoe School Corporation, Licensed School Counselor & Mental Health Liaison



The goal for this grant is to increase the resources of the parents in the Tippecanoe School Corporation by providing training and supplies for co-regulation to be used in the home environment.

In March 2021, the Indiana Youth Institute reached out to public education foundations in the state to share news of a new grant opportunity specifically for PEFs. IYI offered up to 28 grants for \$2500 each for three different focus areas. PSFTC partnered with the Tippecanoe School Corporation to develop a proposal to expand an existing program that provides co-regulation kits to families.

"Neuroscience shows that humans develop their abilities for emotional self-regulation through connections with reliable caregivers who soothe and model in a process called 'co-regulation'." (McKnight, 2016). The goal for this grant is to increase the resources of the parents in the Tippecanoe School Corporation by providing training and supplies for co-regulation to be used in the home environment. The funds would be used to supply 300 Co-Regulation kits to families of TSC students, along with training (video and written instruction) on how to utilize the tools and resources included in the kits.

In May, parents were able to sign up for the kits, and the 300 mark was reached in 56 minutes! What strong validation that this resource is needed. At last count, requests for kits were at 850 and climbing. Everyone beyond 300 will receive instructions on how to construct a kit for less than \$10 at home and a video on how to use it.

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
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
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
