Grant Spotlights

MATTHEW PENDLETON: MILLER ELEMENTARY Water Monitoring and Fresh Water Activity



This immersive project transported third graders to Camp Cullom in Frankfort,



IN for a day filled with learning and exploring. Students conducted tests on two sources of water: Spring Creek, a free-flowing waterway, and an irrigation drainage tile which drained water from a nearby, low lying area. Students compared various data points from the samples including temperature and pH. In addition, they collected invertebrate samples and learned how to classify the specimens. Two final activities, fishing with cane poles (which proved to be a challenge with the free-flowing creek) and a scavenger hunt hike rounded out the day.

"Based upon the papers the children wrote after the trip and anecdotal evidence, this trip was without a doubt a success,

as judged by the experiences the children wrote about, the overall enjoyment of, and engagement with, the activities, and ability to make an overall determination of the quality of the creek based upon the data collected. I look forward to leading another class on this adventure." ~ Matt Pendleton

DIANA REIF: JEFFERSON HIGH SCHOOL

TAM Merchandising Project

This project was a student-driven, real-world experience for 2nd and 3rd year fashion students to practice the marketing concept. After studying several marketing concepts, students chose to produce and market terrarium kits complete with handmade macrame holder, terrarium ball, dirt and accessories



packaged in a hand-printed gift box. Through the semester long process, students produced and sold 40 kits. The sales allowed for seed money for the next year of students.

"While the students original plan was lofty and they did not quite meet the expected goal of product produced, it was a great real-world experience that could not have been achieved without the support of the grant. This was a new course with new curriculum and the grant gave me an opportunity to evaluate the supporting teacher and establish a plan for future course work that gives future students the same opportunity. Building connections through people and community is a valuable skill and lesson to learn. Through three grant funded activities spanning the 2024-25 school year, high school and kindergarten students will visit an apple orchard, collaborate to make food items from local businesses, host a demonstration by Primient and grow their own tomatoes and herbs to make pizza sauce. There are tangible benefits with these activities and many learning standards will be addressed as students study the life cycle of an apple tree, make apple turnovers, design a gingerbread house and grow plants and herbs. Most importantly, I want my students to learn to work with others, to learn integrity and empathy. Every day I see students who struggle with not only confidence, but the fear of failure and judgment. Students need boosts in confidence for their own wellbeing and mental health. and I feel these activities and the partnership with kindergarteners and community partners will do just that.

Our eighth annual Cupcake Run was held on September 17, 2023 at Cumberland Park in West Lafayette. Over 850 walkers, runners and volunteers participated and help raise \$24,500 for our Seeds for Excellence grant program. We are so

A Recipe for Success



In January and February of 2024 culinary students at Greater Lafayette Career Academy, Harrison High School, Jefferson High School and McCutcheon High School spent time in the kitchen developing and testing original cupcake recipes for entry in the Cupcake Bake Off competition.

Representatives from Primient, a local producer of food and industrial ingredients made from plant-based, renewable sources, visited classrooms to share information about careers in food manufacturing. After helping students with a hands-on activity that had teams deconstruct and then reconstruct the sweetener used in Sprite, they left students with a task: develop a cupcake recipe using soda pop and candy as two of the ingredients.

Cupcake entries were presented at the Bake Off & Tasting Party on February 15 at GLCA. A record crowd attended and helped select the People's Choice winner: Harrison High School and their Shirley Temple cupcake.

A panel of culinary experts: Sierra Morin of Sierra's Sweet Shoppe, Emily Horn of Emily's Eats and Janice Buckles retired Purdue Nutrition Science Department evaluated all the entries and crowned Best in Show and a \$1,000 prize to **Greater Lafayette Career Academy First Year Team**. Their winning recipe was titled "Popping Strawberry Soda Cupcake" and included grape pop rock candy, strawberry soda and homemade macrons.
